Jean Goodnow, Ph.D.

Dr. Jean Goodnow is an exemplary leader in the field of higher education, she has made considerable contributions to the community, lead with vision and compassion and is of the highest moral character. Dr. Jean Goodnow has been President of Delta College since 2005. She earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Sociology, a Master of Arts Degree in Rehabilitation Counseling, and a Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Higher Education Administration from the University of Iowa. In addition, she has completed post-graduate study at Harvard University. Jean has over 40 years of higher education experience and before joining Delta College, she was the President of Illinois Valley Community College in Oglesby, Illinois (1996-2005).

Jean Goodnow is a servant leader and encourages her team to do the same. She advocates for their involvement in the community and leads by example. She has championed diversity efforts and shared her expertise in building capacity of non-profit and civic organizations. Jean has served on the board of directors for several local organizations, including Midland Tomorrow, Legacy Center for Student Success, Field Neurosciences Institute, Saginaw Future, and the Bay Area Chamber of Commerce. She was personally involved in the Great Lakes Bay Regional Trail system, including the Saginaw connection. Additionally, she spends a significant amount of time representing Delta College and the area, across the state and nationally.

Jean is a well-respected member of the Saginaw community and Great Lakes Bay region. Her leadership has improved the quality of life for area residents. She is a champion for higher education, equality and innovation. She has contributed to innovative efforts at the College resulting in thousands of area residents improving their education and securing employment. She has maintained that Delta College be affordable to all students and advocated that courses taken at Delta, transfer to four year institutions. Through her leadership, Delta College remains the most affordable option for higher education in 70 miles. Jean's service to the business industry is focused as Delta College provides relevant career education. In fact, over 87% of Delta College graduates live in the region and 93% stay in the state.

For anyone who has ever worked with Jean knows she is a passionate leader whose focus on collaboration has been paramount. She has actively partnered with area businesses to see that Delta College can meet their needs by providing workforce training and academic courses. Through her leadership Delta College is ranked one of the top community colleges in the nation. Delta serves 1 out of every 4 high school graduates and Delta College leads in innovation, safety, and technology access for students.



A Fulbright for Delta

President Goodnow heads to France this October

When the letter arrived, Delta College President, Dr. Jean Goodnow, was ecstatic. It isn't every day that a college president is given the opportunity to represent her country, and her college, as a Fulbright scholar.

She'll be one of 12 American Fulbright international education administrators selected to go to France this October to attend an educational exchange seminar between the people of the United States and of France. Of the 12 selected to attend the seminar, Dr. Goodnow will be the only one representing a community college, or the State of Michigan.

Her specific research is on France's Higher Education System and how they address issues like affordability, graduation rates, job placement rates, and more.

"One thing I've learned in my 40 years in higher education is that some of the richest professional development occurs through connections and sharing of best practices," said Goodnow. "There is always more to learn. France is the next step for me."

As Delta College president, she has also traveled to Kenya in support of Delta's partnership with two Rift Valley area colleges, as well as traveled to India with 15 other college presidents to share the community college model.

Bringing best practices and more knowledge back to Delta is the overall goal, as well as inspiring Delta's faculty and staff to create more on- and off-campus international learning experiences.

"I have always been captivated by different cultures," said Goodnow. "My first trip abroad was to Europe right after I received my bachelor's degree. It was an amazing experience."

She's proud that we have some of those types of experiences available to Delta College students. And, she's excited about the prospect of providing even more.

Last year, 146 Delta College students traveled abroad conducting service projects and learning about other cultures. The hope is for even more in the future. "When students have the opportunity to study abroad they get a taste of the world and its diversity," said Goodnow. "It's invaluable."

"Global travel can offer an opportunity to explore other cultures," said Goodnow, a recognized lifelong learner. "It'll be intellectually stimulating and that is very intriguing to me."

Also interested in genealogy, Goodnow said, "Family stories said my great grandmother – who came to America as an orphan – originally came from France, which I haven't been able to confirm."

She went on to share, "This trip offers the chance to see new cultures and how other people live." ■
